## REPORT FROM THE GENEALOGIST

Dear Cousins,

My wife Patricia and I were very disappointed that we could not be with you in person this annual meeting. However, as explained to our Association President, I had waited for some years for a special appointment and as it came just at this time it was not possible to obtain a leave of absence.

Below I am listing some of the highlights of the projects with which I have been concerned since being elected genealogist, and also some of the ideas and plans for the future. Any questions not answered by this report will be cheerfully answered if you will write to me.

- 1. We have established a series of files and indices for easy reference to handle queries from family association members. These are
  - A. An alphabetical file of the searches undertaken in England, listed by Parish and Town or City. This also serves as a guide for our future work in England.
  - B. An alphabetical file of people with surnames other than Hartwell who have been found in the Parish Registers, Bishop's Transcripts, and other documents, in England. These are of people who married Hartwells or in some way were related to a Hartwell.
  - C. A file of all the documents obtained from depositories in England, Canada and the United States. This file consists of copies of Wills, Probates, Newspaper clippings, Old Letters, and other items pertaining to the family. They are indixed by volume, number and page to The Beetle Gazette, if they were reprinted in one of those issues.
  - D. We have continued an index of Hartwells who served in the armed services, a project started by John F. Hartwell, our former genealogist of fond memory. John began this index as a memorial to our relatives who fought for our country, including those who fought in colonial wars and the revolution.
  - E. A file of corrections and additions to the Hartwell Genealogy and Supplement. These are coded to the published genealogy.
- 2. Also in our collection are a number of books and other printed materials relating to the family. Most of these were obtained by overseas book dealers who conducted searches for me to locate these old and rare books. Highlights of the collection include a two volume history of Hartwell in Aylesbury, a complete history of the Hartwell manor house, one of the 1888 editions of the Hartwell Genealogy by Densmore, and a rather large group of pamphlets and articles on the family or relating to the family. Almost all of these items are my own, but are available for study by other members of the family.
- 3. So that as many members of the association as possible could have copies of the materials researched in England we printed two years of *The Beetle Gazette*. In the eight issues covering the two years are to be found practically all of the material gleaned in the English records, plus indices at the end of each volume of the Surnames Other than Hartwell, and of the Parish Records checked. There is a small amount of additional material not printed.
- 4. During the course of each year I answer a number of queries from members of the family. These queries have come from all over the English speaking world. It

has been possible in most instances to help the individuals find their place in the family.

5. I have on hand now a large amount of unpublished materials on the family in the United States, Canada, and a smaller amount on the family in England and Ireland. This material is catagorized as follows:

A. United States: large amounts of material bringing corrections and additions to the Genealogy and the Supplement, and also new meterial in the form of

pictures, clippings and articles from other sources.

B. Canada: same as for the United States.

- C. The balance of the material searched in England under the direction of cousin Ray Harris. This should be printed to complete the publication of the records obtained from England which were reproduced in the two volumes of the Gazette.
- 6. There is also a rather complete file of coats of arms borne by different members of the family, as well as differences in crests, and also literature concerned with the coats of arms of ancestors, and the coats of arms of living members of the family in the United States and England.
- 7. Proposals: for some time I have urged various members of the Association to implement the following proposals, and herewith take this opportunity to call them to the attention of the Association Members.

A. That the annual dues for the Hartwells of America be encreased to provide a

fund for the publishing of a family newsletter;

B. I will be happy to edit such a periodical, and offer my own and my company's services to prepare, reproduce and distribute the newsletter. I should mention that I have published in the genealogy field for 14 years, and the publication of genealogy and heraldic journals is my company's business. Naturally, all services will be given free to the Association, but it is necessary to provide funds for such items as paper, stencils, commercial printing and postage and envelopes.

C. Cost: I urge the Association to immediately authorize a grant to begin the production of such a newsletter, such newsletter to appear not less than

quarterly.

It is important that such a periodical be an Association project, so that all dues paying members will receive copies. It is my conviction, based on 14 years experience in the field of genealogical publishing, that unless this be done soon our Association will cease to exist as a national association. We have nothing at the present to hold all of the members together, and have witnessed in the last few years a steady decline in our membership.

In conclusion I urge the offers and members to seriously consider the above at this annual meeting 1971, and hopefully, to act favorably on them. I am convinced that putting this off for another year will spell disaster for the type of family association we all want; we must begin to rebuild our association, and from experience I know that with a far-flung membership only a regularly appearing newsletter will solve the problem.

My best wishes to all my cousins on the occasion of the annual meeting 1971!

## ENGLISH PROJECT RESEARCH REPORT

Submitted by E. R. Burdon, M.B.E., 29 Cambridge Avenue, Lincoln, England, U.K., dtd 28 January 1970.

## HARTWELL Search, Lincolnshire

1. General. In the course of some years of research into genealogy in this county I cannot recall finding the surname of Hartwell, and I feel certain that members of this old South Midland family did not settle as far east as Lincolnshire.

However, since one can never be certain about ancestors until one has checked (and people moved about more in England in the Middle Ages than we sometimes suspect),

I carried out a thorough search, as outlined below:

2. <u>Wills</u>. I can find no Hartwell wills proved in Lincolnshire between 1320 and 1652. However, I should like to draw the family research group's attention to the three following Lincolnshire wills:

Philip Hertyll, of Fenton, LCC wills, 1532-34, 240 Robert Hartell, of Fenton, 1543-56, 277

William Hartle, of Honington, 1591 i, 239

If the family group considers these surnames as variants of Hartwell, they may wish to have photocopies made.

- 3. Feet of Fines. If the Hartwells had owned land in this county, there is little doubt that they would appear in the Feet of Fines. I have searched the indexes to these at the county Archives Office, and have found no trace of the surname; the indexes were searched from the start of these records (1190) down to the end of the reign of Queen Elizabeth.
- 4. Parish Registers. As junior members of old landowning families like the Hartwells sometimes went into trade and commerce, it was always possible that stray Hartwells could have settled (if perhaps for short periods only) in the old trading and market towns of Lincolnshire, and, since it is apparent to me from the interesting family magazines and other papers mailed to me by Mr. Rodney Hartwell, that the family re-

search group is anxious to cast its net as widely as possible, I decided to search the parish registers (printed, in manuscript, in modern manuscript copies, and in the form of the Bishop's Transcripts of parish registers). Most of the registers date from the year 1538, some from about 1550, and the Bishop's Transcripts normally from 1560 or 1561.

A close search was made, and the towns investigated are set out line by line as follows:

In addition, since it is known that Hartwells lived in Northamptonshire, I searched the Bishop's Transcripts of the following Lincolnshire parishes which border on Northamptonshire (searched 1560-1660):

Uffington Tallington Barholm West Deeping Greatford Langtoft Deeping St. James
NO HARTWELL ENTRIES WERE FOUND.

5. Card Indexes. There are some very useful card indexes at the Lincolnshire Archives Office, containing references to surnames discovered in documents going back to the Middle Ages. A search of these has not turned up any Hartwells.

6. The wider view. In the course of searching, I fairly often visit the Library of the Society of Genealogists in London, and I have kept an eye open (and still do) when there for any likely Hartwell references, ignoring those already obtained by the group's searchers in other counties.

7. The Registers of the Bishop of Lincoln. In undertaking this Hartwell family search, my main hope lay in finding references in these references to such of the family who might have become priests and deacons of the Church; this seemed to me to be the main point of carrying out work on this family in the records preserved at Lincoln.

The family research group, with its wide knowledge of English records, will know that these massive books are in the main a record of appointments within the Church. In the case of Lincoln the first register dates from 1290, and I searched all the registers from this first one through to (and including) Register No. 32 (dated 1660), omitting those registers which have been printed by the Lincoln Record Society (these are already known to the family group, and have obviously been searched on the group's behalf by other workers).

The manuscript registers are not indexed as to names of persons, and it was thus necessary to tackle the laborious task of searching them page by page, paying close attention to all entries under the Archdeaconries of Northampton, Bedford and Buckingham, which then of course formed part of the Diocese of Lincoln.

I had expected and hoped to find many references to the Hartwell family, but in fact I turned up surprisingly few; it looks as though the family did not supply men for the Church until towards the time of the Reformation (apart that is, from Jordan de Hertwell and Richard de Hertwell, already known to you from the 13th century—and these two may not have been members of the actual family; they were possibly just of ("de") Hartwell.

The first reference in the original registers is as follows (my translation from

the Latin):

Register 23, fo. 238. Sir Laurence Isbell presented to the vicarage of Preston Deanery, Northants, 11 Feb. 1509-10, by Thomas Knight, Thomas Hartwell, priest, and Thomas Michell, layman.

I think this Thomas Hartwell must have been the man who was Vicar of Dallington

(see notes further on).

A good deal of research has been done on Northamptonshire clergy, and rather than quote bare dates from the registers here, I feel it will be more useful to you if I quote from the printed books, Northamptonshire and Rutland Clergy, published in recent years. Only three Hartwells are known to have held Church livings in Northamptonshire, from the earliest times. Here they are (and I quote from Volume 6, page 189):

Hartwell, Abraham (occurs as Hardwell in Bridges' History of Northamptonshire, ii, Born at Dorney, Bucks. King's College, Cambridge admitted (aged 17) a scholar from Eton 25 Aug. 1559; matriculated Michaelmas 1559; B.A. 1563-64; M.A. 1567; Fellow 1562-67: (secretary to John Whitgift, Archbishop of Canterbury?); Rector of Stanwick, Northants, instituted and inducted 18 Oct. 1568; Rector of Toddington, Beds., 1570-73; Rector of Tingrith, Beds., 1572; died before 1585; author, classical. Married Anne; she married secondly John Ponde of St. Sepulchre, London, gent. - marriage license, Bishop of London, dated 1 Sept. 1585, to be married at St. Bartholomew-bythe-Exchange, London. Issue; Peter, christened 12 Feb. 1570-72, at Toddington.

Hartwell, Master Thomas (Bridges, i, 369). S.T.B. Vicar of Horton 10 Jan. 1523-24, occurs 1526 (Clerical Subsidies, Lincoln) as John. Perhaps of King's College, Cambridge admitted (aged 17) a scholar from Eton 8 May 1503; of the City of London; B.A. 1519-20; D.D. 1525-26; Fellow 1506-27; Deputy Vice-Chancellor 1526-27; Ordained priest at Lincoln 12 March 1512-13; University Preacher 1515-16; Vicar of Wootten Wawen, Warwickshire, 1523-45.
