ENGLISH PROJECT RESEARCH REPORT: Continued from Newsletter III:1, pages 320-322.

Hartwell (Hertwell), Sir Thomas. Chaplain (Bridges, i, 340, 465, 494; Baker's History of Northamptonshire, i, 69, 134). Probably of Cambridge; Master of Grammar 1520-21. A priest. Schoolmaster of Northampton. Vicar of Dallington sometime between 1509 and 1511. Vicar of Spratton 12 April 1511. Vicar of Brayfield-on-the-Green 16 February 1514-15.

His interesting will is dated 12 June 1520. He styled himself "Sir Thomas Hartwell,

of Spratton, clerk" and desired his body to be buried in the church of Spratton under the "lampe". "Item I bequeath to every of the bead folke of St. Thomas House in Northampton 3d. and to the same house my 3 ymages of Alabaster". He gave legacies to every parishioner in Spratton and to parishioners in Brayfield and Dallington and also to "every scolar (sic) of my parish that can sing 4d. and that cannot 2d., and to every scolar that I have ells 1d., and that have byn my scolars beying at my buriel a peny, to such as have byne my scolars beying not in holy orders present at my buriel 1ld." Other bequests were to his mother, the maintenance of the books, the bridges, the "crosse that ys downe", etc. Executors: Sir John Grene and Sir Richard Wodford, who were to have the rent of all his lands in Holdenby for seven years.

8. Peterborough. Since all clergy of the Diocese of Peterborouth (covering North-amptonshire and Rutland) have been carefully checked out and their records printed (see above), there was no point in spending the family group's money in searching the Registers of the Bishop of Peterborough. However, in the hope of finding other references, I have paid three visits to the excellent Public Library of the city of Peterborough in the hope of finding Hartwell references not previously noted by other searchers.

I ought to add at this point that the Thomas Hartwell, priest, mentioned above under paragraph 7 was apparently a member of the Preston Deanery family (see Beetle Gazette, I:2). I consulted all the likely printed books at Peterborough, but found nothing not already known.

- 9. <u>Lincoln City Public Library</u>. All likely sources checked, including the Cockayne manuscripts, 5 volumes of notes on Lincolnshire families.
- 10. Conclusion: In ending this report I should like to mention that, as Lincolnshire is apparently a new field for Hartwell research, I have cast my findings as far as possible in narrative form, with explanations where necessary as to Lincolnshire archives.

Since writing the above, I have found that there were Hartwells living in Suffolk when the Hearth Tax was collected in 1674. Thomas Hartwell (three hearths) lived at Flixton (Wanfgord Hundred), another Thomas (a poor man--1 hearth) at Ipswich, and the Widow Hartwell (1) at East Bergholt.

ENGLISH RESEARCH:

With the printing of the above report from E. R. Burdon, M.B.E., we have put into publication all of the material received to date from the English researchers. The English Research project, while certainly not completed, has ended the first phase: a general survey of all of England. We must now begin the second phase: the putting into the hands of our researchers certain well defined problems to be checked in the English records. As with the earlier search, the primary goal is the firm establishment of the data on William Hartwell, the first in America. Donations of funds to carry this second phrase forward are welcome, and are to be sent to the Treasurer, David H. Webber, 13 Sleigh Road, Chelmsford, Massachusetts 01824. Mark your checks: English Research Project. A list of the problems to be worked on in "Phase II" will be printed in the next issue.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS:

The response to the first issue of the Newsletter issued in November 1971 was good. We had a number of cordial letters, a few queries, and our Association President reported that family genealogies and supplements were selling once againall very encouraging. We did not receive back from members many of the information forms. We are now embarking on the Second Phase of the English Research Project, and it is anticipated that once again the members of the family association will rally in enthusiasm.

Members are invited to send to the Editor more material for printing in the Newsletter. One of the items asked for by a number of members is that the Newsletter be expanded in size. To do so we need more material and certainly more comment from the members. Let me have your ideas and observations—we can not promise that every idea will be used, but we will try our hardest to see that as many as possible are implemented.

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In Pursuit of William Hartwell, THE IMMIGRANT

The article following on pages 330-332, is reprinted, with permission, from The Colonial Genealogist, Volume IV, Number 3, Winter 1972, edited by Rodney and Patricia Hartwell. In Pursuit of William¹ Hartwell, THE IMMIGRANT

The printed vital records of Concord, Massachusetts, state that William Hartwell died 12 March 1690 in his 77th year. If this is correct, then he would be born about 1613.

So far, of all the parishes searched in several counties of England for William's baptism, the principal lead seems to center on Cranfield, Bedfordshire, where on 21 December 1613, William, son of Francis Hartwell, was baptized. Other children of Francis baptized at Cranfield, were Richard, 20 January 1610/11 (Bishop's Transcript shows "Thos") and Robert, 22 August 1616. (see The Beetle Gazette, Genealogical and Heraldic Chronicle of the Hartwell and Allied Families, Volume I, No. 1, p. 4).

Francis was married at least twice. The first marriage has not been found and his wife Mary was buried at Cranfield, 22 August 1616, possibly dying as a result of complications from the birth of Robert about three months before. (Beetle Gazette, I:1:4). Francis apparently married 2nd, Ann Barnwell, 19 November 1629, both being of Cranfield when they were married there. (Beetle Gazette, I:3:116). A Frances Hartwell, who may be the above Francis, was buried at Cranfield, 31 July 1650. (Beetle Gazette, I:3:116). If so, his wife Ann, must have moved to another parish as her burial is not found in Cranfield records. The Francis Hartwell who was buried at Cranfield, 15 October 1643, is probably the Francis, son of George Hartwell, who was baptized at Cranfield, 20 November 1642.

The Beetle Gazette gives a good clue that Francis, the prospective father of William, may be the Francis, son of William, who was baptized 4 November 1574 at Leighton Buzzard parish, about 8 miles south of Cranfield. If so, he would be about 76 when he died in 1650. This would mean that he was about 42 when his first wife died and about 55 when he married his 2nd wife, and it is likely that his 2nd wife was beyond the age of bearing children, which could be the reason no children of this couple are found baptized in Cranfield.

This could also mean that Francis and his first wife, who were undoubtedly married in another

parish, may likewise have had other children baptized elsewhere. The Beetle Gazette, Volume I, Number 3, page 104, gives the baptisms of a daughter (name unknown) of a Francis Hartwell, baptized 25 (?) June 1607, Mary Hartwell, daughter of Francis, baptized 24 December 1609, and Mary Hartwell, daughter of Francis, buried 5 January 1609 (should be 1609/10). These are found in the Astwood, Buckinghamshire, parish registers. Consider also that Astwood is on the border between Buckinghamshire and Bedfordshire and only about 4 miles north of Cranfield. Thus Francis Hartwell of Astwood and Francis Hartwell of Cranfield, could well be the same person, and the daughter Mary baptized 24 December 1609 at Astwood, could fit in with Richard (Thos?), the first child of Francis baptized in Cranfield on 20 January 1610/ 11, about 13 months later. Also with the daughter Mary being buried 5 January 1609/10, less than two weeks after baptism, the family may have decided to move shortly thereafter to Cranfield.

Why? It is noted that a Nicholas Hartwell married Alice Carrell, 10 November 1606 at Cranfield (Beetle Gazette, I:1:4) and that possibly Nicholas was a brother or other relative of Francis and Francis may have wanted to try his luck in Cranfield where Nicholas was settled. Also on 14 October 1613, Thomas Hartwell of Leighton Buzzard, married Alice Studd of Cranfield at Cranfield, but it is not known if Thomas was related to Francis. He did not have any children baptized at Cranfield and it is not known where he settled.

What happened to the three sons of Francis Hartwell--Richard (Thomas?), William and Robert, who were baptized in Cranfield? A Richard Hartwell had a son Thomas, baptized at Cranfield, 19 September 1646, and a daughter Elizabeth, baptized 3 May 1649, and this could be the Richard, son of Francis, who was baptized 20 January 1610/ 11. However, no other baptisms or records pertaining to Richard are found in Cranfield, and it is assumed that he married as well as lived in another parish. If the son of Francis was named Thomas rather than Richard, there is a baptism of a Sarah, daughter of Thomas Hartwell, 27 March 1638, but there is no other record on Thomas Hartwell found in Cranfield, so it is assumed he lived elsewhere. There is no further record of Robert, son of Francis, outside of his

baptismal record and it is possible that he too, lived elsewhere. Similarly for William, the proposed immigrant ancestor. There are children of a William Hartwell baptized in Cranfield starting with a William on 12 May 1633, but this probably pertains to William, son of Nicholas Hartwell, who was baptized at Cranfield, 25 March 1610, particularly since a child Nicholas of William, was baptized 3 October 1641. William is probably the one buried at Cranfield, 24 April 1655.

Thus it would seem that all the known male children of Francis Hartwell married in other parishes, possibly in the parish of the bride, and lived either in those particular parishes, or elsewhere. It is possible that Francis and his second wife continued to live alone in Cranfield unless the proposed unmarried daughter baptized in Astwood was living with them, although she could have also married in another parish and lived elsewhere. There is also the possibility that some of the children of Francis may have died as infants and the burials not recorded, as in the case of many early burials. Perhaps Francis was content to live in Cranfield with his wife Ann until his death, at which time she may have moved away to live with relatives since her burial is not found in Cranfield records.

There were many families which migrated from Bedfordshire to New England in the early 1600's including several Wheeler families from Cranfield to Concord, Massachusetts, where William Hartwell also settled. A William Odell also came from Cranfield and settled in Concord and a George Lawton came from Cranfield and settled in Newport, Rhode Island. Then there was George Felt, George Kezar, William Sayer and Allen Breed, who settled in various New England towns and came from Leighton Buzzard. Other parishes of Bedfordshire are listed for early immigrants to New England in Banks', Topographical Dictionary of 2885 English Emigrants..., but as indicated by well known genealogists, all the data in this book cannot be taken at face value but should be verified since Banks intended this work as a starting point for further English research. The writer checked the parishes listed in "Banks" for Bedfordshire, with the Beetle Gazette and found that of the 23 parishes listed, all had been checked by English researchers for Hartwells with apparently negative results as regards William Hartwell's marriage. The parish of Rosseter, which was mentioned by "Banks", is not listed in Burke's list of English parish registers, and the name may have been mistaken for some other parish. Perhaps William's marriage should be explored in the London parishes where many of the voyages to New England were organized. Also, because of the religious fervor of the times, many of the young people who were opposed to the formalized religion of the day, flocked to the large cities where a lot of the

action was, and where there were supporters like themselves. In some ways, there is a similarity to the flocking of young people to large urban centers today.

If William arrived in Concord, Massachusetts, in 1636, and all of his children were reportedly born there, he may have married in England shortly before he left. He may have been one of the enthusiastic young men who heard about the opportunities for a new life in the New World, and with his new bride, decided to venture forth after making the proper connections, possibly in the London area. It may be significant to note that according to "Banks", those from Bedfordshire who early settled in Concord, Massachusetts, were mainly from Cranfield (7 families). In fact, in checking "Banks" for all of England, it was found that Cranfield supplied more families than any other parish in England, for the early settling of Concord. Could this be a reason why William Hartwell settled in Concord--because he knew all or many of the families from Cranfield, having come from there himself? Apparently the names of the ship or ships, which brought the early settlers from Cranfield to Concord, have not been located according to "Banks", in his previously mentioned work. It would seem that further efforts to explore this matter should be made, and it would be well to see if the settlers arrived in the same ship or settled in New England about the same period of time.

It is noted that William's wife's name was Jazan with various possible spellings, or it may have been Susan. A deposition dated 11 May 1675, gave her age as 67. This would mean that she was probably born about 1608 and was about 5 years older than her husband. It is possible that she also was born in Bedfordshire and her baptism might first be searched in Cranfield under the above Christian name, and if unsuccessful, surrounding parishes might be searched, since the Christian name is not too common.

Another possibility would be to check on a possible first marriage for Ann Barnwell who married Francis Hartwell, by checking first Cranfield, and if necessary, the surrounding parishes. If such a marriage is found, perhaps wills should also be explored in the general area for not only the surname Barnwell, but also for Ann's maiden surname, for any reference to a Hartwell. In line with this, it might be well to locate the baptism of Ann, and if found, then attempt to locate a will on her particular family. Who knows, maybe some of these people settled in New England!

In William Hartwell's will, reference is made to his "cossen Ffrancis Ffletcher", who was appointed an overseer. Francis Fletcher was a son of Robert Fletcher of Concord. The Fletcher family should also be explored in Cranfield records and those of surrounding parishes, if necessary, for any connection with the Hartwell family.

SOME OBJECTIVES FOR FURTHER RESEARCH ON WILLIAM HARTWELL

- 1. Find out as much as possible on "Cossen Ffrancis Ffletcher", referred to in the above article, and his father, Robert Fletcher of Concord, for any clue as to relationship with William Hartwell.
- 2. Attempt to locate the names of ships that the early settlers of Concord from Bedfordshire came in, in the hope that William's name will be found in the list of passengers, or some clue found which may help to connect William with Bedfordshire. (See "Banks" quoted above.)
- 3. Find the names of ships and lists of passengers coming to New England, say, in 1635, 1636 and 1637, since William is reported to have arrived in New England in 1636 or about this time.
- 4. Further attempt to identify the year William came to Concord. If he were allotted or bought land there about 1636, check to see what other settlers obtained land in Concord the same year, and where they may have come from.
- 5. Of the original 9 acres of land William is reported to have received at Concord, check this record or deed to find any further possible valuable information, such as the names of the neighbors surrounding William's property, for any possible relationship.
- 6. Of the early settlers of Concord, say 1635-1637 from Bedfordshire, what information do the early records of Concord supply about them?
- 7. Check the London area for marriages for William and any other Hartwells, from about 1628 to 1640. This should include searching for marriages outside the Church of England (nonconformist). Anything found might pertain to a brother or sister of William.
- 8. Search for William's wife's maiden surname, in line with the above article, and if found, search for wills of her family for any mention of the name Hartwell.
- 9. Similarly, search for a possible first marriage for Ann Barnwell, and her baptism in Cranfield or surrounding parishes, as a basis for searching wills of her family and any mention of the name Hartwell.

EDITORS' NOTE:

The article "In Pursuit of William Hartwell, The Immigrant" and the above listed Objectives for Further Research, were written for publication in the "Newsletter of the Hartwells of America."

However, we felt that Mr. Reeks' article was certainly an item to be shared with other searchers who may be faced with similar itentification problems.

Both Mr. Reeks and the Editors would very much like to have comments on the identification of William Hartwell, and the thinking of readers who may feel so inclined to share their experiences in this area of genealogical research.
