From South - Exit Maine Turnpike at .



REPORT OF 1982 ANNUAL MEETING, RAYMOND, MAINE.

The 45th Annual Meeting of the Hartwells of America, an association of the descendants of William Hartwell of Concord, Massachusetts, was held on Saturday, June 26, 1982, at the Raymond Village Community Church in picturesque Raymond, Maine.

Glorious weather blessed the event as Hartwell cousins wended their way to a delightful day of renewing old acquaintances and making new friends. Folks began converging on Raymond for doughnuts, coffee and conversation at approximately 10:30 a.m.

At noon, following grace by H. Roger Hartwell, a delectable buffet luncheon was served. The meal was arranged and prepared by Peter J. Rogers, a Hartwell-in-law, to whom the Association is indebted for his simply scrumptuous cuisine.

Following the luncheon, at 12:50 p.m., President Connie Hartwell Cincotti called the business meeting to order. The title of this message is not an acknowlegement of the well-known longevity of us Hartwells; rather, it recognizes that the history of our annual meetings actually dates back to 1884.

The eloquent one-penny postal card reproduced above (received by Charles C. Hartwell of No. Vassalboro, Maine, my great-grandfather) summoned the Hartwell Family Association to its Second Annual Reunion, held September 17, 1885, in Concord, Massachusetts. The then Corresponding Secretary was the same L. W. Densmore whose Hartwell Genealogy, <a href="Hartwell Genealogy

I do not know whether my great-grandfather attended any of those early reunions, but as photos in the Hartwell archives attest, a great many persons did--despite comparatively rigorous modes of transportation which made travelling any distance much more difficult than now.

My first Reunion was that of 1951. I remember, from then through the sixties, gatherings of large numbers of Hartwells for whom the fellowship of sharing family history and experience was always worth the trip. Lately, however, attendance has fallen off, a trend we should strive to reverse.

To that end, I suggest, first, that we overlook for the moment the hiatus between the gatherings of L. W. Densmore's time and the Reunions of today and that we view this year's meeting as the 100th, an event certainly worthy of commemoration. Second, all interested Hartwells should be on hand to assist in planning the 1984 Reunion, which in fact will mark the 100th anniversary of the first organized meeting of the "Hartwell Family Association" in 1884. Let us look upon that event as impetus for rebuilding the "assemblage."

To paraphrase Mr. Densmore: A much larger attendance than at the Reunion of last summer is warranted, and all members of the Association are requested to be on hand in good season. "Come early and spend a pleasant day, renewing old acquaintances and forming new ones."
