MINUTES OF THE 1988 ANNUAL MEETING OF THE HARTWELLS OF AMERICA

Lincoln, Massachusetts

The 51st annual Reunion of the Hartwells of America was held on June 25, 1988, at the Barn behind the Hartwell Tavern on Virginia Road (also Known as Battle Road for its part in the American Revolution) in Minuteman National Historical Park, Lincoln, Massachusetts.

A gathering at 10:00 a.m. over coffee and doughnuts gave old and new members a chance to get acquainted. All were invited outside for the annual group photograph taken by Alison Hartwell.

A delicious picnic luncheon, provided by Chris Hartwell, was enjoyed prior to the business meeting.

At 1:30 p.m. the business meeting convened with a prayer from H. Roger Hartwell. President Wayne Hartwell introduced the Association officers in attendance: David Hartwell Webber, Treasurer; Priscilla F. Hartwell, Corresponding Secretary; Judith Bacon Hartwell, Recording Secretary; Joy F. Peach, Genealogist; Connie Cincotti, Scholarship Committee; and Alison Hartwell, Photographer.

A moment of silence was observed to honor the passing of James C. Hartwell, San Diego, CA (October 28, 1986) and Warren L. Hartwell, Taunton, MA (March 20, 1985).

The President called for the reports of the officers and committees:

The Recording Secretary's Report of the 50th Reunion, June 27, 1987, was accepted as printed in the Newsletter.

The Treasurer's Report, submitted in writing, was accepted by the meeting. It was also reported that, although in the past use of the Barn at Hartwell Tavern had been free, in the future the Park Service was required to charge a fee for such use; the fee (assessed for the first time for the 1988 Reunion) will be in the \$250-\$350 range.

Connie Cincotti next offered the Report of the Scholarship Committee. A very nice thank you letter from Scott McConnell, who received a scholarship the previous year, was read. The Committee voted three scholarship grants for the 1938-1939 academic year, in the sum of \$100 each: Seth Rogers, Portland, OR; Lucinda J. Peach, Indiana University, Religious Studies; and Julie Hartwell Webber, Bridgewater State, MA, Business Administration and Accounting.

Joy Peach, Association Genealogist, reported that her article on Sarah (Hartwell) Melvin Smith had been accepted for publication in the New England Historic and Genealogical Society's "NEXUS". Joy reported that she had done the first two generations on a computer to which she was fortunate to have had access. After discussion, it was voted to appropriate \$5,000 to acquire a computer and necessary peripherials to permit Joy to commence work upon a new Genealogy. (Editor's Note: since that vote, several computer "mavens", most notably, Steve Hartwell and H. Clifford and Linda Watts, have generously offered aid and assistance to Joy in getting this project on track). Finally, Joy shared her most interesting research of the preceding year into the "Samuel Saga".

HARTWELLS NEWS & NOTES

MARY HARTWELL DECLARED HEROINE

Mary (Flint) HARTWELL, wife of Samuel Hartwell of Lincoln, has recently been accepted for inclusion in the Index of genuine Revolutionary War Patriots of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The story of how Mary carried the alarm of April 19, 1975 in the middle of the night from the old Hartwell homestead to Captain William Smith's house was most recently told in YANKEE magazine's issue of September, 1985, "Anatomy of a Battle." This article was based on the story in the 1930's publication, "Heroes of the Battle Road", but the DAR required an even earlier account of the incident before they would accept Mary's descendant into their organization.

Your Genealogist was able to find an account of Mary's deed, as told by her to her grandson, in Abram English Brown's book, Beneath Old Rooffrees (1896). This text is part of Brown's "Footprints of the Patriots" series, which is accepted by the DAR as proof of Revolutionary service.

Mary now joins another HARTWELL female on the DAR Patriot Index. Sarah (Hartwell) SHATTUCK of Groton, one of a group of women who captured a noted Tory spy at Jewett's Bridge between Pepperell and Groton, has been on the DAR list at least since 1960.

The DAR is always happy to be able to accept a female patriot into the ranks, because—as is generally accepted—Revolutionary era women certainly did their part towards the struggle for independence, but since their cotributions are so often undocumented, their service goes unrecognized.
