MINUTES OF THE 1993 ANNUAL MEETING OF THE HARTWELLS OF AMERICA Lincoln, Massachusetts

For the eighth successive year, the Annual Reunion of the Hartwells of America - the fifty-sixth such gathering - was held at the Barn at the Hartwell Tavern, Virginia Road, Minute Man National Park, Lincoln, MA, on 25 June 1993. Despite trepidations arising out of the concurrence of the Reunion and an air show at neighboring Hanscomb Field, the day went off without a hitch as traffic congestion failed to materialize and the thunderous overflight of jets only occasionally wholly drowned out any attempts at conversation. At one time or another, however, many of the 34 in attendance were more intent on observing skydivers than exchanging Hartwell facts and fancy. The states of Alabama, Georgia, Massachusetts, Maine, New York, and Vermont were represented.

Following the noon luncheon* the business meeting opened with the observation of a moment of silence in remembrance of departed Hartwell cousins, and especially former Association officers and Reunion faithfuls H. Roger Hartwell¹¹ and Alden W. Webber⁹.

The first item of business was the ratification of the expenditure of \$2,514.45 for the acquisition and erection of the new tablet, or headstone, for William¹ at the Old Hill Burying Ground, Sleepy Hollow Cemetery, Concord, MA. The assemblage gave Evelyn¹⁰ and Jim Allison a richly deserved vote of thanks and appreciation for their labors in bringing this project to a swift and very satisfactory fruition.

* Ed. Note: Green Acres Turkey Farm, for several years the source of the menu offered to Reunion attendees, fell victim to the local recession in late 1993. Rather than scare up a replacement, the Association officers determined to try a wholly "picnic tending towards pot luck (smallish, cold dishes only)" format for the 1994 Reunion. Beverages, chips, plates, and utensils will be available. Should this experiment flounder, we would welcome volunteers to locate a new vendor and make appropriate arrangements.

The recording Secretary's report was accepted as contained in the Spring, 1993 Newsletter.

David Hartwell Webber¹⁰, Association Treasurer, advised that the balance standing on account as of the 1992 Reunion had been \$15,985.71. The year's receipts, comprising of bank interest on the Scholarship Fund (\$301.49) and the Operating Fund (\$254.13), combined with payments of annual dues and charges for Hartwell literature (\$272.25²), to be offset by expenses for the 1992 Reunion (\$275.00), Newsletter postage (\$160.30), two scholarship awards (\$200.00), and the cost of the William¹ headstone. The balance remaining as of 26 June 1993 was \$13,704.83.

Connie Hartwell Cincotti¹¹, Scholarship Committee Chairperson, announced the Committee's award of three scholarships for the 1993-1994 academic year, in the amount of \$100.00 each, to Julia Watts, Alexander Chin, and Julia Jones.

In the absence of Joy Hartwell Peach¹⁰, Association Genealogist, President Wayne E. Hartwell¹² reported that Joy had completed the fifth generation of the new Genealogy and was investigating publication. Joy would be interested in - and grateful for hearing from anyone out there in Hartwell Land - who could offer advice and counsel in this regard. It was voted to forward to her a letter of thanks and appreciation for her dedication and assiduous efforts on behalf of the Association.

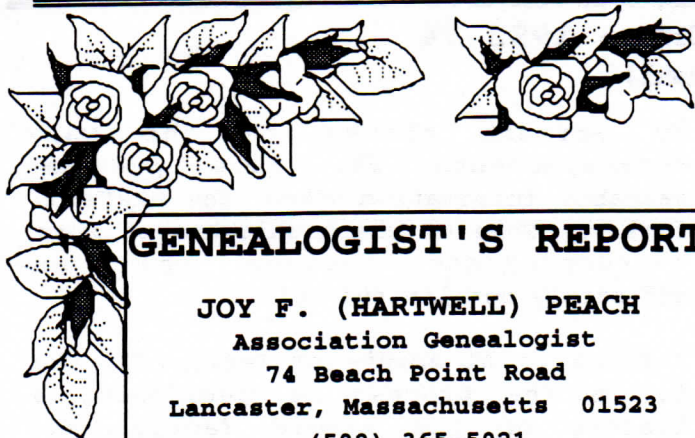

HARTWELL, ALZADA, wife of Charles Waldo¹¹ (John Howard¹⁰, Charles C.⁹, John H.⁸, John⁷, Isaac⁶, Jonas⁵, Samuel⁴⁻³⁻², William¹) Hartwell died in Concord, Maine on 25 November 1992. She was survived by her husband, one son, Robert Gordon Hartwell, and two daughters (news clipping submitted by Alice B. Hartwell).

HARTWELL, FLORENCE IVA (BERRY), born 19 June 1911, Embden, Maine, died 19 May 1994 in Millinocket, Maine; long-time resident of North Anson, Maine; married 12 October 1929, former Association President William Gray Hartwell¹¹; mother of current Association President Wayne E. Hartwell¹², and grandmother of Newsletter Publisher Susan Rutledge¹³; leaves also Wilma Gae (Hartwell) Morse¹², Charles Richard Hartwell¹², Howard Allen Hartwell¹², William Gray Hartwell, Jr.¹², 12 grandchildren, and 23 great-grandchildren. A long time Reunion attendee and ardent supporter of the objectives of the Association. She will be missed.

HARTWELL, KENNETH¹⁰ (James Edward⁹, Follett Gerrish⁸, James E.⁷, Benjamin⁶, Edward⁵⁻⁴⁻³, John², William¹) died at Worcester, MA on 3 October 1993. He is survived by a daughter, Anne-Marie Hartwell, a brother, John Hartwell, a sister, Terry L. Hartwell, nieces and a nephew (obituary, Telegram and Gazette).

HARTWELL, WALLACE BRADLEY¹⁰ (Amos Bradley⁹, George Edwin⁸, Amos Bradley⁷, etc.) died at Hatley, Quebec, Canada on 22 October 1993. He is survived by his wife, Hazel (Huff) Hartwell, daughter Wendy May (Hartwell) Kline, and son David Wallace Hartwell. (Reported by Ruth (Hartwell) Cutler.)

HARTWELL, WARREN HERBERT¹⁰ (Harry Olin⁹, William Herbert⁸, Thomas J.⁷, Amasa⁶⁻⁵, James⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², William¹) of Bedford, MA died there on 21 August 1993. He is survived by his wife, Mary T. (Balcom) Hartwell and many nieces and nephews (obituary). *NOTE: William Herbert⁸ Hartwell was previously one of the "unattached Hartwells" but thanks to some good detective work on the part of Jim Allison, we have been able to "attach" this line.*

PREMISAS, HERBERT LEASON, husband of Jacqueline Cutler and son-in-law of William and Ruth¹⁰ (Hartwell) Cutler, died at Montreal, Canada of Lou Gehrig's disease on 10 January 1993. He is survived by his wife and two children.

GENEALOGISTS REPORT - 1993-94 (continued)

1993-94 was a busy year. In early 1993, New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS) published an article I wrote on the DUNTON family. While not really Hartwell-related, this article "flushed out" several members of clan Hartwell, who have kept me busy writing letters. Hopefully, some of them have become members of our Hartwell Family Association.

In July I attended a five-day course on English research at NEHGS in Boston. It was a terrific experience, and I found a lot of good stuff while browsing in NEHGS's library between and after the sessions. While no positive proof of William¹'s English origins was found, our instructor, George Redmonds, feels that I am on the right track in my (tentative) identification of William as the son of Francis and Mary (--?--) Hartwell of Cranfield, Bedfordshire. My roommate for the course was a lovely lady who was researching the ODELL/ WOODSELL family, another early Concord, MA family that probably originated in Cranfield, Bedfordshire.

Every linguistic expert I've spoken with has been most intrigued and baffled by the unusual name of William¹ Hartwell's wife Jezan. Most agree that it certainly does not sound like an ENGLISH name, and one fellow went so far as to suggest that it sounded Barbadian to him. Although I don't want to start any rumors, this may not be so far out as it sounds. There was quite a "triangle" trade between England, New England, and Barbados, and William could have come to New England from Old England via way of Barbados. The Mormon International Genealogical Index shows several Hartwells in Barbados during the 1600's. This theory that Jezan was Barbadian might explain why the name wasn't used by any of her descendants for generations, and may be an avenue for further research. Any volunteers?

My warmest thanks to the many correspondents who have provided valuable information about the HARTWELL family. Some of the highlights of this correspondence include (but are definitely not limited to):

* Kudos to **Al Brodie** of Perry, SC, who is in the process of publishing a history of the Brodie Family, and generously shared all his research on the descendants of the Rev. Jesse⁷ (Jesse⁶, William⁵, Daniel⁴, William³, Samuel², William¹) and Margaret (Brodie) Hartwell with me.

* Thanks to **Ruth Rhonemus** of Ayer, MA, who provided information about her ancestress Sarah Eliza⁸ Hartwell (James⁷, Amasa⁶⁻⁵, James⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², William¹) of Shirley, MA. Sarah's birth is listed in the 1956 genealogy, but there is no mention of her marriage and descendants.

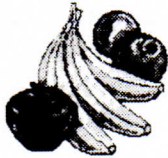
* By one of those strange genealogical coincidences that happen occasionally, both Brother **Xavier Werneth** of Rome, Italy and **Sue Roe** of Seal Beach, CA sent me (in the same week!) copies of Joseph⁵ Hartwell's probate file from Lyndon, Vermont, showing that he died in the "spring of 1805" and not in 1803 as reported in the 1956 edition. We are still working on this elusive Joseph's children.

* A three-way correspondence between **Perry McLellan** of Anaheim, CA, **Cynthia Ricketts** of Vermont, and myself has resulted in greatly expanded knowledge of the large family of Nathaniel and Hannah⁴ (Hartwell) Powers, who went from Littleton/Acton area of MA to Greenwich, MA (now underwater, thanks to the Quabbin Reservoir), to Chesterfield, NH, then to Springfield, VT, and lastly, to Ferrisburgh, VT. This family really got around!

* Speaking of Vermont, huge thanks to **Caroline Brown**, who copied every single "Hartwell" reference she could find in the Vermont archives at Montpelier, and has provided much other valuable Hartwell data from western MA and Canada as well.

* Thanks also to **Phoebe Cortessis** of Reliez Valley, AZ and **Vivian Relfschneider** of Nokomis, FL for providing some interesting data on the descendants of Eleazar and Sarah⁵ (Hartwell) Melvin. Seems old Eleazar was a Loyalist during the Revolution, although the rest of his family were Rebels.

MRS. HARTWELL'S QUICK APPLE CAKE

(Found in "Peaceful Gatherings" a cookbook compiled by the members of the Federated Church of Bolton, MA)

1/2 Cup shortening	2 Cups sifted flour
2/3 Cup sugar (or 1/3 Cup sugar & 1/3 Cup honey)	1/2 tsp. salt
2 eggs	1 tsp. baking powder
1 Cup raw ground apple (cored, but not peeled, include juice)	1 tsp. baking soda
	1/4 Cup chopped nuts

Cream together shortening, sugar, eggs, and apple. Add flour, salt, baking powder, baking soda, and nuts. Pour batter into well-greased pan. Bake at 350° for 55 to 60 minutes.

HINTS: A food processor does a great job of "grinding" the apple. A 9" x 13" baking pan seems to work well with this recipe.

Recipe From The Past!

I'm sending the recipe for the Hartwell Farm Clam Chowder. It really is delicious but not too considerate of the waistOh well.

When my husband was a graduate student at Harvard from 1962 to 1966, I took care of a little girl, Diane Coleman, while her mom was in the hospital giving birth to a second child. We had two small children of our own at that time and both our families had severely limited financial resources. Our friends splurged and took us to the Hartwell Farmhouse Restaurant in Lincoln, MA., as a way of expressing their gratitude for Diane's caretaking.

We were tremendously impressed with the Hartwell Farmhouse, a rustic home-like setting with huge wooden beams, located in a wooded area in Lincoln, MA. The sparkling clean kitchen contained 3 cast iron, wood-burning ovens. There were two large open fireplaces and many interesting pieces of antique furniture. Miss Fitch, who waited on us, looked like she herself could have just stepped out of the 17th century. Her physical appearance in a long cotton print dress and her snow-white hair done in a neat bun gave me the impression of a lady about 80 but she seemed young in her enthusiasm for the Hartwell Farm and high energy level. She reminded me of my grandmother, Mary Viola Hartwell (b. 14 Nov 1873), who was always energetic and enthusiastic about life and lived to be 93 years old.

The clam chowder was so delicious that we asked Miss Fitch for the recipe which she graciously gave us.

HARTWELL FARM CLAM CHOWDER
By Miss Marion Fitch

|--------------------------------|---------------------|
| 1 Cup diced potato | 3/4 Cup diced onion |
| 1 oz (1/4 Cup) cubed salt pork | 1 1/4 lbs clams |
| | 1 Cup Water |
- Salt and Pepper to taste
 2-3 Cups Cream (light or heavy)

Put potatoes and onions through food chopper together. The onion juice prevents potatoes from darkening. Fry out pork in heavy aluminum pot. Put alternate layers of clams and potato mixture into kettle. Cover tightly and bake 15 minutes at 400 degrees and then 45 minutes at 350 degrees or less, until the seafood is done. Use a fork to test doneness. A glass casserole with a cover is o.k. if no aluminum pan is available.


When done, place in the refrigerator overnight to mellow. Also at this point, the mixture may be frozen if desired. When ready to serve add cold cream to cold chowder base (thawed if frozen) and heat in a double boiler. Do not add cream to hot chowder and vice versa. Make sure all ingredients are the same temperature to avoid turning the cream.

HARTWELL AS A GIVEN NAME

In going through the new genealogy, it struck me how many Hartwell daughters had married and used their maiden name as a given name for one of their sons. This practice seems to have begun with Hartwell Barnes of Connecticut, who bore the name as early as the 1740's, but was most prevalent in the late 1700's and early 1800's. Often this penchant for using Hartwell as a given name skipped a generation and appeared in a grandson, and in some instances its use was even more remote from the Hartwell ancestor, making one wonder if the name was given less as a commemoration of an ancestor and more because it was a nice sounding name. One also wonders what, if anything, these men were called as a nickname!

Following is a list of men (alphabetically) who bore the given name Hartwell, and their connection (if known) to the family tree. Further research on this topic is encouraged, as it may result in greater knowledge of the family.

HARTWELL WINSLOW ARNOLD, son of Joel and Ruth (Parmenter) Arnold, grandson of Winslow and Abigail (Hagar) Arnold, great-grandson of Joseph and Lydia (?Fay) Arnold and great-great-grandson of Joseph and Dorothy⁴ (Hartwell) Arnold, was born at Marlborough, MA on 1 January 1819. He married at Sudbury, MA on 16 December 1847, Fanny W. Fisher. Nothing further is known of his life.

HARTWELL BARNES, son of Moses and Mary (Wolcott) Barnes, and grandson of George and Mary⁴ (Hartwell) Wolcott was born in Connecticut in 1748 and died 11 September 1820. According to the DAR Patriot Index, he was a Revolutionary soldier.

HARTWELL L. BROOKS, son of Charles H. and Lois (Lakin) Brooks and grandson of Simeon and Lois⁵ (Hartwell) Lakin was born 9 June 1830 and died 18 August 1856.

HARTWELL BULLARD, son of Malachi and Polly (Littlefield) Bullard was born at Medway, MA 6 March 1802 and died at Holliston on 19 September 1845, where he is buried in Central Cemetery. He married (1) at Holliston on 12 March 1825, Alvira Pond, who died 8 May 1835, age 35. Hartwell and Elvira were the parents of Francis Hartwell Bullard, born 1 August 1830, died of inflammation of the lungs on 16 April 1845 at age 19, and Edwin Pond Bullard, born 25 August 1832, died of consumption on 5 July 1849 at age 17. Hartwell married (2) 12 March 1836, Hannah J. Brooks of Upton, who died at Holliston on 24 October 1845 at age 37. Does anyone have any ideas why this Bullard gentleman was named Hartwell (and why he named a son Francis Hartwell?)

HARTWELL E. BUTLER, son of Harvey and Alzina/Salyne Jane⁶ (Hartwell) Butler was born at East Otto, NY in 1833 and married Marietta Frank. Other than these facts, very little is known about his life.

HARTWELL COOK, son of Elijah and Relief⁵ (Hartwell) Cook, was born at Putney, VT on April 1791. Although the published Vital Records of Putney give the name as "Cromwell", both your genealogist and a descendent of this line feel that the name has been mis-read by the compiler. Hartwell/Cromwell Cook may have died young, as there are no further records of him.

HARTWELL W. GREEN, son of John and Lucy (Proctor) Green and grandson of Reuben and Lydia⁶ (Hartwell) Green was born at Alstead, NH on 5 May 1809 and married at Concord, MA on 19 March 1834, Sarah Turner of Jaffrey, NH. He was a farmer in Litchfield, NH.

HARTWELL HAYWARD a/k/a **HARTWELL HOWARD**, son of Simeon and Sarah (Hosmer) Hayward and grandson of Simeon and Rebecca³ (Hartwell) Hayward, was born at Sutton, MA on 10 September 1769 and died at Millbury, MA in 1858. On 30 November 1799 he married at Auburn, MA, Lucy Prentice. The published Vital Records of Auburn to the Year 1850 give his name as **HOWARD HARTWELL**, which caused quite a bit of research on the part of your genealogist until she figured out what was going on.

HARTWELL J. HILL, son of Henry and Emily (Lincoln) Hill was born at North Smithfield, RI on 1 December 1882. Apparently not a descendent of "Clan Hartwell," he was reportedly named to honor a Hartwell family from southern Vermont who brought up his orphaned mother. (Your genealogist noticed his name in the Worcester Telegram & Gazette's obituary of his daughter, Edith, and called his son, Oliver W. Hill in West Brookfield. Interestingly enough, although Oliver W. is apparently not a Hartwell, his wife (a genealogist in her own right) is descended from William¹ Hartwell of Concord via Phineas⁴ Hartwell of Fitchburg. **HARTWELL HILL** married at Enfield, CT, Grace E. Harrington, and fathered the following children: Edith G., born in Enfield in 1919, died in North Brookfield, MA on 18 December 1993, married Gardrad L. Prothro; Howard E. Hill of Maryville, TN; Nelson J. Hill of Port Charlotte, FL; and Oliver W. Hill of West Brookfield, MA.

HARTWELL KEITH, son of Robert and Silence⁵ (Hartwell) Keith, was born at Bridgewater, MA on 26 August 1764 and died there 21 April 1801. He married on 8 July 1786, Seabury Wilbur and fathered 7 children.

HARTWELL AS A GIVEN NAME

HARTWELL KEITH, JR., son of Hartwell and Seabury (Wilbur) Keith and grandson of Robert and Silence⁵ (Hartwell). Keith was born at Bridgewater, MA on 23 March 1793 and married on 8 April 1816, Mary Bassett. Hartwell and Mary Keith reportedly moved to Dudley, MA.

HARTWELL LAKIN, son of Moody and Betsey (Gove) Lakin and grandson of Simeon and Lois⁵ (Hartwell) Lakin, was born in New Hampshire on 7 July 1820 and married Minda G. Barker. According to the 1956 Genealogy, he was a jeweler in Bennington, NH.

HARTWELL LAWERENCE, son of Absalom and Priscilla (Green) Lawrence and grandson of James Jr. and Priscilla⁵ (Hartwell) Green, was born at Pepperell, MA on 27 August 1801. Nothing further is known of his life.

HARTWELL LITCHFIELD, son of Samuel and Roxanna (Shattuck) Litchfield and grandson of Samuel, Jr. and Hannah⁵ (Hartwell) Shattuck, was born on 3 November 1821 and married Joan Hiland.

HARTWELL MELVIN, son of Josiah and Esther (Marshall) Melvin and grandson of Eleazer and Sarah⁵ (Hartwell) Melvin was born probably at Nottingham, NH on 10 August 1805 and died on 6 April 1863. He married in June 1833, Judith Spaulding of Warner, NH. He was a millwright and had 8 children.

HARTWELL NEWTON, son of Lyman and Polly (?) Newton was born in 1821. He was "of Holliston, [MA] age 25" when he married at Marlborough on 9 March 1846, Mary R. Dunton, daughter of Thomas and Catherine(?) Dunton, age 23. There is no known reason why he bore the name "Hartwell."

HARTWELL PERKINS, son of Nathaniel and Sarah⁶ (Hartwell) Perkins was born at Watertown, NY on 26 April 1832 and died in January 1900. Although twice married, he had no children by either wife.

HARTWELL POWERS, son of Joseph and Rebecca (Stearns) Powers and grandson of Nathaniel and Hannah⁴ (Hartwell) Powers was born in Ferrisburg, VT on 20 October 1792 and died there on 1 September 1876. He married Belinda Tracy.

HARWILL [sic] REYNOLDS, son of Isaac and Zada (?) Reynolds and grandson of James F. and Sarah⁵ (Hartwell) Reynolds, was born in Dutchess County, NY on 2 December 1831 and died there on 7 September 1907.

HARTWELL J. ROBBINS, son of James B. and Sarah Jane (Perkins) Robbins and grandson of Nathaniel and Sarah⁶ (Hartwell) Perkins, was born prob. at Watertown, NY on 11 February 1853 and died 18 April 1863.

HARTWELL RUSSELL, son of John and Elizabeth⁵ (Hartwell) Russell was born prob. at Windsor or Stowe, VT on 25 April 1789, and married at Stowe on 12 September 1811, Leba Bennett.

HARTWELL SHATTUCK, son of Samuel, Jr. and Hannah⁵ (Hartwell) Shattuck, was born at Pepperell, MA on 19 February 1788 and died at Ontario on 2 December 1875. He married Mercy Safford of Rockingham, VT and fathered 8 children.

HARTWELL SHEPARD, son of Samuel and Elizabeth (Lummers) Shepard and grandson of John and Lydia⁴ (Hartwell) Shepard. Nothing is known of Hartwell Shepard except that he "went west."

HARTWELL WILLIAMS, son of Seth and Zilpha (Ingraham) Williams and grandson of Jeremiah and Abigail⁵ (Hartwell) Ingraham, was born at Hallowell, Maine on 15 November 1781 and died at New Orleans, LA on 13 October 1818. He married on 25 May 1808, Sarah Bridge of Dresden, Maine. He was a merchant and captain. Hartwell Williams had three children.

HARTWELL WOOD, son of Jonathan and Dolly (Jones) Wood and grandson of Isaac and Elizabeth⁵ (Hartwell) Wood, was born prob. at Rindgo, NH on 27 October 1815 and died on 26 July 1846. He married Laura Snell and had one child who died in infancy.
