

This past year has been productive and exciting in many aspects. My special thanks to President Wayne Hartwell and Marilyn Booth Manzella, who have been working hard to get the early generations of the Hartwell family saga ready for publication. I deeply appreciate the times they have traveled to Lancaster to consult with me, and I especially appreciated Wayne's trip to deliver a new computer monitor just before the great blizzard of 2005 struck!

Correspondence with "new" members of clan Hartwell has added many names to the family tree. It's always dangerous to name names, lest someone who provided valuable information gets left out, but I would like to mention a couple of the more interesting/challenging correspondents — Jerry Hartwell of Ohio and Tim Fenton of Barrie, Ontario, Canada. Jerry is descended from Frank Hartwell of Indiana and we have been working to try to untangle some of those Indiana Hartwell families that were so neglected and/or ignored in the 1958 genealogy. Tim Fenton is descended from Thomas Hartwell, who went from Vermont to Canada many long years ago. Assistant genealogist Ray Harris did quite a bit of work on Thomas back in the 60s, some of which was published in the supplement to HOA, and Tim is helping to add to that information. It's always exciting to see what Hartwell query is going to pop up next in my email, and send me back to the archives for more research.

Last year I discovered the Social Security Death Index (SSDI) on the web, and found it to be both a great help and a great frustration. A help in that it gave me both birth and death dates and places for a lot of the Hartwells in the 1958 genealogy, and frustrating because I have been able to identify less than half the people listed on it. I decided to put the names of all the deaths

that occurred in 2004 into this newsletter in the hopes that someone will be able to identify at least one of the unknowns.

#### A DIFFERENT WIFE FOR EBENEZER<sup>5</sup> HARTWELL (#106 EML)

In case anyone thinks the Hartwell genealogy edited by John F. Hartwell and published in 1958 is the final word on the Hartwell families mentioned therein, a recent discovery should put that idea to rest. The Hartwells of America is not the only source that identifies Ebenezer<sup>5</sup> Hartwell's wife as Mary Farnsworth, daughter of Matthias and Abigail (Shedd) Farnsworth of Groton, as the Farnsworth genealogy contains the same [mis]-information. It may be that Hartwell copied Farnsworth or Farnsworth copied Hartwell, or perhaps both editors arrived at the same conclusion independently, but in any case, the conclusion is not correct. Your genealogist was leafing through a small book found on a back shelf of the Worcester Public Library entitled Groton in the Revolution by Samuel A. Green and found a deposition whereby widow Mary Hartwell of Groton stated that her son, Edmund Farnsworth, enlisted in the Revolutionary army when he was only sixteen. Since the only Edmund Farnsworth in Groton of this age was the son of Ebenezer and Mary (Nichols) Farnsworth, and since the same Ebenezer Farnsworth had died slightly over a year before the marriage of Ebenezer Hartwell to Mary Farnsworth, the only conclusion would seem to be that Ebenezer Hartwell had married the widow of Ebenezer Farnsworth rather than the daughter of Matthias and Abigail, who, by the way, were also the parents of the Ebenezer Farnsworth who married Mary Nichols and fathered Edmund and two other sons. This doesn't change any Hartwell genealogical data, as Ebenezer and Mary's two daughters never had any children, but Mary (Nichols) (Farnsworth) Hartwell did have descendants from her Farnsworth sons, all of whom served in the Revolution. Mary is also credited with knitting stockings for the Revolutionary soldiers, so would be eligible to be listed on the DAR Patriot Index if any of her Farnsworth descendants ever care to claim her.

#### HARTWELL INVENTORS

Many thanks to former Hartwell Association president Charles A. <sup>10</sup> Hartwell for information regarding Hartwells who received patents for a variety of inventions. There will be more about these inventive members of the family at the annual reunion:

**Abraham Vedder Hartwell** of Chicago received a patent in 1869 for an improvement in locks for freight car doors. In conjunction with Insley Johnson he received a patent in 1870 for a furnace for drying sand.

**Bartholomew Hartwell** of Baltimore, MD received a patent in 1875 for an improvement in corpse-preserving caskets.

Charles Hartwell of Boston received a patent in 1858 for a metal window sash.

Charles S. Hartwell of Westfield, MA received a patent in 1875 for an improvement in chucks for turning whip-stocks.

Edwin N.7 Hartwell of Sharon, CT received a patent in 1872 for improved ox-bow pins.

Edson Hartwell of Hubbardston, MA, received three patents — 1867, 1868, and 1869 — for rocking chairs

Frank Henry Hartwell received a patent in 1906 for a hose nozzle.

George W. Hartwell of Cincinnati, OH received a patent in 1875 for a method of attaching handles to vessels (shovels, etc.)

Oscar Dana Hartwell received a patent in 1901 for a folding cardboard easel.

Samuel E.(?) Hartwell of New York City received patents in 1847 for a cigar making machine; in 1856 for a mosquito net frame; in 1858 for a bed bottom; in 1859 for a hand seeder, and he was in New Albany, IN in 1864 when he received a patent for an improvement in dovetailing machines.

### Minutes of the 2004 Annual Meeting of the Hartwells of America

Approximately thirty Hartwell cousins (the count is inexact because some failed to "sign the Book!) gathered at the First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church in Concord, MA, to observe the sixty-seventh Annual Reunion of the Hartwells of America Association, held on Saturday, June 36, 2004. From 10:00 to noon attendees got up date on Hartwell facts and fancies while enjoying pastries and beverages, after which the picnic luncheon break was taken.

The business meeting was called to order by President Wayne E. Hartwell, Foxborough, MA at 1:10 p.m. Roger Whichter Hartwell, N. Quincy, MA offered an opening prayer, which was followed by the observance of a moment of silence in memory of Hartwells and others having passed away since the last Reunion. Thanks were extended to Reunion Committee member Marian Wheeler, Concord, MA for again seeing to the very accommodating arrangements at First Parish. Marian welcomed the group on behalf of First Parish and proposed that the Association become a member of the Friends of Minuteman Park. After motion and discussion, \$10 was voted for that purpose.

The first order of usual business was the adoption of a motion that the Minutes of the 2000 Meeting be accepted as published in the Newsletter, with one slight amendment.

Treasurer David Hartwell Webber, Dunstable, MA reported on the Association's financial condition for Fiscal 2004. As of June 26, 2004, the Scholarship Fund stood at \$9,260.86 and the Operating Fund at \$3,271.27. Total funds on hand decreased \$319.88 from June 28, 2003. Receipts for the Fiscal Year from interest, dues, Hartwell literature, and donations to the Scholarship Fund, totaled \$1,109.25; expenditures for the 2003 Newsletter and Reunion and four Scholarships were \$1,429.13. A motion to accept the Treasurer's report carried unanimously.

Upon motion, a donation of \$50 for the Social Law Library was voted in appreciation for the time of Art Director/Graphic Designer Carole Doody in once again producing the Newsletter.

Scholarship Committee Chair Victoria H. C. Rogers, Otisfield, ME, announced awards of \$100 each to Stephen J. Hartwell, Ferndale, WA, attending Seattle Pacific University in Seattle, WA and majoring in Biology and Music, and Natalie Richardson, Mendota, IL, attending Wartburg College in Waverly, IA and pursuing a degree in Vocal Performance.

Genealogist Joy Hartwell Peach, Lancaster, MA reported on her finds over the preceding year and the progress of the new Genealogy. The fly in the ointment regarding completion of the first five generations remains indexing, a problem which the Genealogy Committee is going to solve before next year's Reunion.

Award winners for the day were Priscilla Hartwell, Palmer, MA, eldest lady in attendance, and Gilbert Pinkney, Lempster, NH, eldest gentleman. The award for youngest to attend was taken home to Johnson, VT by Elena Houriet, granddaughter of longtime Reunion attendee Caroline Brown of Westford, VT. The trophy for traveling the furthermost to attend went to Richard H. Negus, Dunwoody, GA. Katy Hartwell doubled up as also being the youngest to attend.

To conclude the business meeting, the group voted to return to First Parish in 2005 for the Reunion. Finally, it was voted to donate \$200 to First Parish for the use of the facility and \$75 to the Sexton for his care throughout the day. A vote to adjourn the business meeting was carried., following which Association Photographer Alison Hartwell, Quincy, MA, took the customary group photograph.


